National Jazz Foundation article on Stan Kenton Concert awards given to P.C. & A.P.

Song quote on Bebop analyzed by A.P. A.P. sat in with Dizzy Gillespie.

On changing musical styles. Ragtime, jazz, swing, etc.
On "Walking the Dog", other dances.

Dixieland jazz.

Then, A.P. leader of own band.

Composed "Onzaga Blues", High Society", Snake Rag"[or "Snake Blues"[:::], "Loympia Rag". Played with Louis Armstrong, M.P., King Oliver. 3 months stay in [L.A., Calif.?] (End of article)

Prob Ebony article A.P. said to be 70 then, P.C., 64.

Had on Onward cap [original from '30's? '20's?]

Article on P.C.'s band at Paddock. Says oldest clarinetist in city. From "slick cover" magazine. On Oct. 19, 1960, was 82. Last played about 3 months ago. Arm broken. Made T.V. show about 2 years ago. Still owed \$55. Union may have money. "No fool, no fun."

Now uses Albert system. Better tone and easier [Cf previous interview, Apr 4, 1958].

On playing with Buddy Bolden. Not outstanding.

All his good friends have left him. A.G. said, "Who fall down, stay down." Was good b, good musician, and good painter. Al old age A.G. climbed 60 ft ladder.

Ricard Alexis & Picou like 2 brothers. R.A. one of the best on trumpet in town.

Other members of B. Bolden band - Albert Glenny, b; 'Ti'
Boy Remy, q; Big Bill Harrison, tb, from uptown, [Black] Happy
Goldston, d, who A.P. calls Happy Golden. [Cf. H.G. interviews]
15 keys on A.P's clarinet. Doesn't use all keys. A.P. plays
"High Society" without keys. When reed too hard, uses knife
to scrape. [Cf. interview Apr 4, 1958].

Led own band. In A.P.'s whole life, he has used only one mouthpiece. Puts top teeth on it. [Cf. previous interview, Apr 4, 1958]. Wooden mouthpiece. The owner of Werlein's gave A.P. his clarinet. Came from France. A.P. offered \$1500 for it. No other like it here. Same barrel. Not repadded.

Alphonse Picou Reel II N^Ovember 3, 1960

In all brass bands on Eb clarinet. Cut thru. You can hear for a mile. No curved up bell on Eb cl. Eb has smaller mouthpiece. Still has Eb cl.

W.R. heard A.P. in parades about 15 years ago across the river. [Isidore] Barbarin in band on alto [horn]. A.P. was a g king. Still has g. Doesn't play with funny guitarists "around here". [Obscenity here]

Brother Ulysse was great tenor. About 4 years younger than A.P. Great composer. Sung in French and Creole.

Says "Qui vous" [trans] "Who told you I was going" [U.P. song]. U.P. had another about a girl cooking a chicken [Cf. "Eh, LaBas" words sung by Danny Barker]

Dead about 4 years. Comical. Made [up?] "Eh, La Bas". Means "And Over There". U.P. played guitar. Played in bands. A.P. taught U.P. [leading?]. Misses brother.

A.P. led band at Paddock. [P.C.'s] photograph undated. Has another [scrap?] book. A.P. went to plantations. Played many places, with many bands.
